Professional Achievement

Bill Kinney, Jr., is in his 54th year with the Marlboro Herald-Advocate in his hometown of Bennettsville, South Carolina. After graduating from Wofford College and the University of South Carolina College of Journalism (where he was copy editor for Columbia's daily, The State) and two years' active duty with the US Army Public Information Office, he joined the Marlboro Herald-Advocate as reporter, then advertising manager, business manager, managing editor before becoming President/owner/Editor-Publisher in 1970. He established The Marlboro Shopper weekly in 1984, served as President of the S.C. Press Association and its Weekly Division, and the S.C. Press Association Foundation. He was founding partner and President of the Carolinas' first cooperative central newspaper printing plant, Greater Pee Dee Press, Inc., and Vice President of weekly Hamlet (NC) News and Sandhills Publishing Co, Inc., another central newspaper printing plant. He has won numerous awards for his reporting, features, and weekly local editorials, and has encouraged excellence from his reporting/sports/photography/advertising staff, who also have won many awards and accolades.

Community Leadership and Service

Bill Kinney's personal and newspaper involvement and leadership in community organizations are extensive and exemplary. He served as Bennettsville City Councilman and Mayor Pro-Tem, President of Bennettsville Rotary Club, United Fund, Bennettsville Jaycees, Bennettsville Parking and Development Co., Inc.; Marlborough Historical Society, the 1777 Saint David's Society, and as chairman of Marlboro County Committees for S.C. Tricentennial and U.S. Bicentennial, and as Chairman of Marlboro County Historic Preservation Commission, Jennings-Brown Historic House Restoration, Downtown Bennettsville Preservation Commission, The Kinney Charitable Foundation, Neil C. Monroe Charitable Trust Fund, Whipple Foundation Trust, Marlboro Civic Center Foundation. He also serves as Vice Chairman of Bennettsville Downtown Development Assn. and was his county's SC Economic Ambassador.

NNA/National Involvement

Bill Kinney and his family have attended and participated in a number of NNA Conventions and his newspaper was a NNA Blue Ribbon Newspaper. He has an extensive involvement in state and national organizations: Vice President of S.C. Historical Society and SC Jaycees, Director of US Jaycees, Director of SC State Chamber of Commerce, Member of SC Development Board, Chairman of SC Archives and History Commission, President of Confederation of SC Local Historical Societies, V. Chmn. of SC Hall of Fame, Member of SC Committee for the Humanities, Director of Security Federal S&L Assn., Chmn. of SC Review Board for National Register Nominations, Trustee of McLeod Medical Center Foundation, V. Chmn. and Trustee of Scotia Village Retirement Community, Member of Marlboro County Interstate 73 Committee, Trustee of Palmetto Conservation Foundation and Palmetto Trust for Historic Preservation.

Nationally, Bill has served three terms as Chairman of the Board of Trustees of the American Folklife Center at the Library of Congress, as Chairman of the Board of Advisors for the Southern Region of the National Trust for Historic Preservation, Director of US Jaycees, Director of Wofford College National Alumni Assn., Member of Brookgreen Gardens Board of Trustees and President of Friends of Brookgreen Gardens. He is isted in Who's Who in America.

Awards include recipient of Doctor of Humane Letters from Wofford College, two SC Governors' Awards for Historic Preservation, Charter initiate into USC College of Journalism Diamond Circle, winner of SC Education Assn. School Bell Award, named Marlboro County and South Carolina Young Man of the Year, named Marlboro County Boss of the Year, recipient of Elizabeth O'Neill Verner State Arts Advocacy Award and SC General Assembly's Folk Heritage Award. He is author of three publications - Sherman's March - a review, Three Who Dared, and The Story of the Sculpture LIGHT.

This letter is to nominate William L. Kinney Jr., long-time publisher and editor of the *The Martboro Herald-Advocate*, for the Amos Award.

Mr. Kinney epitomizes the ideals of community journalism through his service to his local community, his state and his profession. In matters concerning both the past and the future, Bill Kinney has been a moving force in Bennettsville, Marlboro County and South Carolina.

His appreciation of his community's arts and history is intense, as a visit to his newspaper in a beautifully restored downtown home will testify. Mr. Kinney has served as Vice-Chairman of the Civic Center Foundation since its inception. Under his direction, the Kinney Foundation provided the seed money for the initial fundraising to renovate the old opera house into the Marlboro Civic Center (\$75,000) and an additional \$5,000 later for lobby furnishings. The Foundation also provides programming funds for the Civic Center. He also secured funding for the purchase of the historic Weatherly-Walker House as the Marlboro Arts Council's new office.

He has served on many local and state historical organizations, including terms as president of the Marlborough Historical Society and chairman of the Marlboro County Historic Preservation Commission.

But his contributions aren't just of the arts and historical nature. He was a founding member of the Marlboro County Development Board and is vice-chairman of the Bennettsville Downtown Development Association. The list of his other community service is long.

The esteem in which he is held by his journalism peers can be demonstrated by his election as president of the South Carolina Press Association in 1972-73. More recently, he was selected as president of the S.C. Press Association Foundation from 1992-94. He has been nominated to serve on the foundation board for the coming year. His paper has won numerous press association awards and he was awarded the Harris Award for Editorial Writing in 1966. He remains active in SCPA and helped lobby for Freedom of Information Act reform. Mr. Kinney was selected as one of the first recipients of the University of South Carolina College of Journalism's Diamond Circle Award.

Mr. Kinney is a diverse and talented man who has had the insight and energy to make a major impact on his community. I can think of no one more deserving of your award than he.

While Marlboro County struggles with many challenges, including high unemployment, we would be so much worse off if it were not for the gracious and dedicated efforts of this fine man.

After graduating from Wofford College and the University of South Carolina College of Journalism, and after serving his country in the U. S. Army, Bill came back to his hometown where he joined his family's management of the *Marlboro Herald-Advocate*. Since that time, he has single-handedly tackled community projects and has championed many worthy causes in our community. I particularly enjoyed working with him closely as we planned and carried out a local effort to renovate an old downtown theatre into a beautiful and vibrant local Civic Center, which now serves as a 400-seat public auditorium which hosts many concerts, plays, public meetings, and has become the "focal point" of our town.

More recently, Bill was integrally involved in building a beautiful new public library in our community and naming it appropriately for Bennettsville native Marian Wright Edelman to honor her lifetime of work on behalf of children.

At the national level, Bill has distinguished himself and has always enjoyed the highest respect of every member of our Congressional Delegation, both Republicans and Democrats, who admire his genuine community spirit. Bill has served three terms as Chairman of the Board of Trustees of the American Folklife Center at the Library of Congress. He has also served as Chairman of the Board of Advisors for the Southern Region and on the National Board of Advisors of the National Trust for Historic Preservation.

I am writing to lend my enthusiastic support to the nomination of William L. Kinney, Jr. for the Amos Award. As Director of the South Carolina Department of Archives and History and State Historic Preservation Officer, I have had the pleasure to work with Mr. Kinney for nearly a decade. During that time I have come to know him as the state's most dedicated advocate of preserving South Carolina's history.

Over the course of a lifetime of service to South Carolina, Mr. Kinney has held positions of leadership in nearly all of the state's largest historical organizations. He has served as President of the Confederation of South Carolina Local Historical Societies, Chairman and Vice Chairman of the South Carolina Archives and History Commission, Chairman of the South Carolina Review Board for National Register Nominations, Vice Chairman of the South Carolina Hall of Fame, and Vice President of the South Carolina Historical Society. He has served as a member of the South Carolina Committee for the Humanities and as a trustee for the Palmetto Conservation Foundation and the Palmetto Trust for Historic Preservation. In each of these positions he has been an active and fervent leader who works to educate South Carolinians about their past.

A telling example of his value to this state lies with his many years of service as Chairman of the South Carolina Review Board for National Register Nominations. In that capacity he has played a critical role in the recognition and preservation of hundreds of the state's most historically significant properties. Through his efficient and judicious oversight of the review board's operations, Mr. Kinney has enabled the State Historic Preservation Office to process and forward to the National Park Service many more nominations than other, similarly-sized states. As a result more South Carolinians have received recognition for their stewardship of our state's most important historic sites and properties, which increases the odds that those places will be preserved in the future.

Mr. Kinney's efforts on behalf of the state's cultural resources have not gone unnoticed. He has received numerous accolades, and he can count among his awards the highest honors from state and national organizations. He is the recipient of two Governor's Awards for Historic Preservation and the Robert N. Pryor Volunteer Service Award, which is presented by the Confederation of South Carolina Local Historical Societies. In 2002 he received an Elizabeth O'Neill Verner Award, which is the state's highest award for support of the arts. He also has received the South Carolina General Assembly's Folk Heritage Award, and, most recently, Mr. Kinney received an Award of Merit from the American Association of State and Local History in 2010 for his lifetime service to the Marlboro Historical Society.

For more than fifty years Mr. Kinney has taken an energetic and keen approach to preserving South Carolina history and culture. I can think of no other South Carolinian who has contributed so much of their personal time or resources to ensure that the state's past will be saved for future generations, and for that he deserves the gratitude of all South Carolinians. His community leadership is without equal in South Carolina, and I believe that he would be a most deserving recipient of the General James O. Amos Award.
